Skills Center

Don Voas did helped people in making natural edged bowls at the Skills Center on January 4, 2020. Here is a recap of what he showed.

NATURAL EDGE BOWLS

Don Voas

This is NOT a beginning woodturners first project -- one should be experienced, proficient, comfortable and relaxed using a bowl gouge turning many bowls before attempting a bark-on natural edge bowl.

Select timber harvested late fall or winter after sap has drained from cambium layer to root system. Attach wood to lathe: Faceplate – Woodworm Screw – Between head/tail stock center – Scroll Chuck.

Put a white paper on the lathe ways under the wood to better see the natural edge "ghost" image. Anchor gouge to tool rest – gouge toe/tip typically cutting at the wood vertical center.

Bevel -- Ride/glide the gouge bevel. Simple, elementary:

- 1) point gouge nose where you want to cut
- 2) align gouge bevel to follow/ride/glide that cut as you move the gouge forward.

Gouge flute generally should be closed fully facing the forward direction of the cut when entering the wood, then rotated open up to max 45° as the cut continues. Left hand stabilizes gouge on tool rest (fulcrum). Right hand guides the gouge cutting tip/edge. Woodturner's body can make more precise moves than hands or arms alone . . . so hold the gouge handle in the right hand, "lock" gouge/hand/arm to body and move body by shifting your weight from one foot to the other to move the gouge cutting tip. (You lefties know how to reverse this!)

Cut to shape the outer bowl edge from bottom toward top which quite often pulls bark off. Cutting into bark from outer bowl edge can prevent this. Fortunately, bark usually comes off in small pieces vs. a large projectile such as if a huge "catch" pulls a bowl blank out of a chuck at high speed. Big gouges cause bigger "catches" than smaller gouges.

Skills Center — Continued

General guideline: Finished natural edge bowl rim must have all bark on or all bark off – no in between. If bark appears fragile or about to fall off, apply sanding sealer or a coat of the final finish to about ¼" or more solid wood near the bark and wipe excess off.

Then apply thin CA glue and accelerator to the cambium layer and the bark. Do not allow CA glue to spread to unprotected wood beyond the sealer/finish coat or it most likely will negatively influence the final finish. Make small cuts (thin shavings). Not a race, not a time to "hog off" thick shavings.

Wet wood moves as it dries. For best stability, turn the bowl inside wall thickness to 1/10 the max bowl diameter in 1" steps from rim to bottom – do not go back or take a break. Mark wood species and date on bowl base. Apply Anchorseal, put bowl in brown kraft paper bag, stack with stickers, put in kiln, etc., for bowl to dry. Check periodically for mold, cracks, etc. Allow bowl blank to stabilize at local relative humidity, usually 3 to 12 months depending upon wood species, wall thickness, etc. Then remount on a lathe and turn to final wall thickness and finish. Alternately, turn wet wood to 3/16" wall thickness, allow to dry and warp, sand (especially to get flat base or fashion 3 feet so the bowl will sit flat on a table) and finish.



Tips and Tricks

Clamp Those Rings and Other Things

If you have a set of Cole jaws or the like and a live center for your tailstock which can accept your scroll chuck, the lathe can work as a great 'press' for many projects.

Perhaps you are doing a segmented piece, or simply need to stack some lumber or other materials. Mount the base on the headstock end by whatever method. Then place the piece to be added in the Cole jaws. Lasty, protect your lathe bed from glue drips with some paper or cardboard. Glue up the surfaces and then bring up your tailstock, lock it down and tighten it against the piece in the headstock.

This works great for segmented rings. It's really easy to alight the seams and then check it all the way around by rotating it on the lathe. Most glues need around 30 minutes to take a good set at which point you can release the Cole jaws and then back off the tailstock. Then add the next ring.

The downside is it keeps your lathe tied up for a while. The upside is you don't need to build a press or fight clamps trying to keep good alignment.
