February Demo

Rings and Things—John Hinton

When—Tuesday February 18th at 6:30 PM

Where—Crimora Community Center

John will concentrate on ring making but will quickly cover some other jewelry items. Ring making will include using various materials beyond wood, such as copper and titanium. The demo will be a bit upside down at times, starting off with a special UV resin finishing method so the finish can set and be passed around as a finished product during the meeting.

We'll show how to use standard copper plumbing pipe to make ring cores. We'll also explain how to use copper sheet metal as inlays within the ring blanks. A number of tools will be introduced which make the process much easier. Of course, we'll go through the step by step process of creating a ring.

About John Hinton

John Hinton started woodworking at age 5 or before. They moved from that location when he was 5 but he vividly remembers using a wood rasp to shape the propeller for a whirly-gig among other things at that home. Woodworking came naturally to him allowing John to excel in school shop classes as well as various projects done at home.

In 1977, John went to work for his brother's cabinet shop. Later he went on to become a sales rep for a woodworking tooling and machinery company where John visited most of the woodworking shops in about half of Virginia.

In 1989, John opened his own cabinet shop and ran that until 2009. In August of 2017, John ordered a live center for his old Delta wood lathe, also known as a dust collector. Suddenly having great success, next came a scroll chuck. This transformed his life. "I was hooked!", John said.

John enjoys making a wide variety of wood turned items and is constantly experimenting with new forms and finishes. He sells items through his Etsy store, JohnHintonWoodturner.
