It looks like the coming "cherry challenge" will be done in walnut, instead of cherry, as that is what Starke has the most of. Wood will be



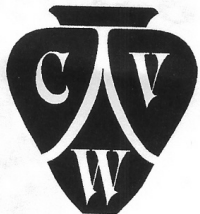
available at the February meeting and the pieces can be worked on at the March meeting (to be held at the Miller School). The pieces will be on view at the April meeting for a non judged review.

I plan to attend and hope to share this experience with as many club members as I can encourage to attend. I am looking into a van rental (we've done this to go to Martinsville to a NASCAR race and it wasn't bad), to see if it makes sense for the club. Regardless of our mode of transportation, I would like to extend an invitation to any of our younger members (Ben for one). If I drive my own vehicle, I will offer a free ride; and, if we rent a vehicle, I (and I hope any others sharing a rental cost would too) would certainly be willing to divide the cost only between the adult members.

Improving the flow of CVW meetings: Jesse Wasserman, in addition to being a CVW member, is also a member of the Tidewater Turners. In an email Jesse recently made some comparisons between CVW and TT, some very positive (he praised the friendliness of our club members) and some constructive comments on improving our meetings.

Jesse commented that more time is spent at our meetings on club business and announcements and not enough focused on demonstrations and more fundamental learning/hands on issues. He said that the Tidewater group has an executive committee to handle more of what we have been discussing as club business, so that these issues are handled outside of the main meetings.

I would like to propose a sort of ongoing executive committee meeting by starting our meetings at 6:30 rather than 7, with the extra half hour open to any who wish to discuss club business, direction, new issues, etc. This is flexible and can be an extension after the meeting, if early does not fit peoples schedule. I just feel that any that want to participate in setting club direction should have a forum and full voice.

Coming Shows, Symposiums, Events, etc.

This is a repeat from the January Newsletter. Because of its importance, and because it is within a reasonable driving distance, we will repeat this announcement in each issue, right up to the June date of this symposium. The **AAW's 20th Annual National Symposium** will be held this year in Louisville, KY June 22-24. Louisville is only about a 9-10 hour drive from us. What an opportunity to see not only the best in the US, but the best in the world. The symposium will have over 140 demonstrations, plus three woodturning exhibits within easy walking distance of the show hall.

The **Utah Woodturning symposium** is the longest running woodturning symposium in the world. 2006 marks the 27th anniversary of this event. It runs June 15th – 17th, 2006 at

the Brigham Young University in Provo, Utah. There will be over 100 demonstrators given by some of the world's best. For information see www.utahwoodturning.com.

The AAW has announced an invitational exhibition titled, "**Tops, Boxes, and Treenware of the World**" to be held at its Gallery in Landmark Center in St. Paul, MN. The exhibit will open on Friday, January 13th and will run through April 14th. Treen is defined as turned items used in the home such as: covered boxes, sewing boxes, eggs, needle cases, pin cushions, and lace bobbins. The exhibit will consist of hundreds of turned items.
