We have room for one more, if anyone needs a ride. It's a chance to see some of the best, not just turners of the US, but many from other countries as well.



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Turner's Tips

Proper lathe turning height:

The recommended appropriate height for your lathe turning can be found by raising (or lowering) the lathe so that the spindle height is just even with the underside of your forearm, with your forearm held parallel to the floor as you stand in your turning position at the lathe. Many of the lathes now have adjustable feet to allow some adjustment of the turning height. Alternatively, you can cut blocks of wood to put under the feet of your lathes base to adjust this height. Much of the fatigue of turning can be avoided with this adjustment to avoid unnecessary bending over for a too low lathe, or stretching and reaching when the lathe is too high.

In coming newsletters—Making a Longworth chuck and making your own three point support:

In the next couple of months issues I plan to make a Longworth chuck as show in the Winter 2006 issue of Woodturning Design and a three point outboard support like the one Bert got as a Christmas present this past Christmas (see the picture in the January newsletter). I hope to make the support using roller blade or skate board wheels and my own design. If all goes well, I hope to parlay the support pictures, etc. into an article for one of the turning magazines. To date, I haven't seen anyone making their own in any of the magazines I take. The Longworth chuck is like the large wing like plates that can be used on a regular four-jaw chuck to expand their capacity to hold finished bowls, etc. It is made from two layers of MDF or plywood, with an ability to rotate to expand and contract to accept various size bowls. Don't worry, pictures will make it more understandable. Part of making the Longworth chuck will also include making wooden replacements for the rubber clamping buttons that come with the commercially available aluminum plate jaws. These are supposed to be a better alternative to the rubber buttons.
