
Bert reported on his demo to the Smith Mountain Turner group, doing his demo on his picture frames.



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# Shows, Symposiums, etc.

I had the opportunity this month to attend *The Adirondack Woodturners Association—Totally Turning 2005* woodturning symposium held at the "Egg" in Albany October 15th and 16th. I will try to give an overview here and follow up with a little more detail in an addendum to follow later.

The Egg is a very nice theatre and convention center complex in the center of Albany. The symposium was sponsored by the Adirondack Woodturners Association, a special interest group of the Northeastern Woodworkers Association, and a chapter member of the AAW. Their club has approximately 150 members and, to my understanding, they were the solo club sponsoring this event.

Part of the reason for my attendance, in addition to the fun of attending such an event, was an attempt to broaden my exposure to woodturning symposia. In this regard, I met with Ken Evens, one of the committee members responsible for the event. Ken was very forthright in his discussion of the event.

Some of the items that Ken said they had considered important to the success of their symposium were:

 The inclusion of world class turners/ demonstrators in order to attract a large attendance (Note: The <u>paid</u> attendance at the symposium was approximately 200, however their members who participated as volunteers were not required to pay admission.);

- They included a very nice, two day program for spouses not interested in the woodturning program. Cost of this extra was approximately \$\$50;
- They had six simultaneous venues (at least one too many, in my opinion);
- They had their program, and the auxiliary spouse program, reasonably well planned and well staffed:
- They had two of the demonstrators (Andi Wolfe and Stuart Batty, both world class stature) do a very informative critique of the instant gallery. In addition, all of the demonstrators had a number of pieces on display at the instant gallery.

From the above items felt to be important by Ken, I would add some comments on how these items struck me:

Since we are in an area with fewer 'big city' attractions, I think their emphasis on world class demonstrators could have a little less emphasis. However, I was very impressed with the demonstrators and think we could greatly increase the success of our next symposium with the

inclusion of at least one 'name' turner. Binh Pho is reasonably close (Pennsylvania), and certainly is of world class stature.

If we can muster enough volunteers, I think a program for spouses not devoted to woodturning could be reasonably easy to pull off (Monticello, Michie Tavern, the Cultural Museum, Wilson's birthplace), and could be handled with a couple of rented vans from Enterprise.

The instant gallery was very well handled and had a very full participation. I got as much out of the critique as I did out of any of the demonstrations. Both of the people doing the critique were knowledgeable and instructive in their comments. The room for the instant gallery was also where the vendors had most of their display booths. The gallery was on display on table in the center of a reasonably large room (about like a high school auditorium), with seating for the critique session.

The demonstrators included:

Nick Cook—very good demo on production turning for gifts, etc.

Andrew Motter—natural edge goblets

Kurt Hertzog photographing your work

Peter Lovello—metal spinning

Paul Petrie-thin wall

green turning

Keith Tompkins and Steve Sherman–form and design

Stuart Batty—thin walled exotic bowls

Andi Wolfe-pyrography

Linda Slatter—segmented turning

The last three, plus at least Nick Cook, are world class in their specialties. The four mentioned really impressed me with their demonstrations. I have seen Binh Pho and Graeme Prittle and each were equal to these two.

Ken was also very candid about the finances of their symposium and how they have done in the past. Of course they pay more for the Egg then we should have to pay for something like the Expo. and they offset this with a high fee for attendance; however, they were not sure they were going to break even. The program for spouses was a near break even. The cost of non local demonstrators raised their costs as two were from CA and one from Ohio.

I have more observations that I will try to formulate for our symposium committee as soon as I can.
