Turner's Tips

For any of you that are not yet doing some form of dust collection, and/or using a respirator or mask, it's time to start. What we may think of as a common wood, with no potential for lung irritation, and worse, can be a source of anywhere from a moderate to severe health threat. Most of us have access to, and turn Ash and/or Walnut. Both can be a very threatening source of lung and skin irritation. Any spalted wood should be handled as a potential health threat.

In fact, almost any wood dust can be a potential health threat and great care should be taken to avoid breathing sanding dust.

Make, or buy, a funnel that you can attach behind the turning area of your lathe. Cardboard, light plywood, sheet plastic, many materials will do to form the funnel which is then attached to your dust collector or a shop vacuum. If you don't have either, old shop-vacs are common items at swap meets and are usually reasonably priced, especially when some of the accessories are missing. This won't matter if you can devote this unit exclusively to you lathe.

Run the collection unit whenever doing sanding; or better yet, whenever the lathe is in use.
