Summary of Meeting Regarding VA Symposium submitted by Ron Dearing

The committee planning the VA symposium meeting had several items that should be passed along:

◆ The AAW is asking for a \$200 donation from each VA club affiliate. There will be a month long (I think that is the duration) display of pieces from VA clubs on display at a private gallery in Richmond. If sold, the gallery gets 50%. If not sold, the \$200 donation is to cover the anticipated approximately \$1500 cost to pack and ship the pieces back to those not sold.

Contribution of the \$200 from each club will have some payback: the symposium package received by each attendee will contain a sheet about the VA symposium; there will be a display at the instant gallery where VA clubs can have their work and brochures on display (in addition to any instant gallery entries); and, there will be a similar area at the private gallery.

• The VA symposium, "It's your turn! A Woodturning Experience" will have a unique format. There will be four invited noted VA demonstrators, with a standard format demo by them, two demos each day of the symposium. When these demos are not in session, there will be 10-12 stations (mostly lathes, but with a couple of sharpening stations too) with volunteer VA club member mentors to demonstrate, teach, and do hands-on audience participation demos.

This will be much like our last club meeting format.

- Any VA club member can be volunteer to be a mentor at the VA symposium and will receive free admission for the symposium for the day they mentor. It is required that you also be a member of AAW to be a mentor. This is to cover the insurance issues.
- To cover security during the symposium, two to three volunteers are requested to stay during the nights as security guards. You can bring a cot, etc. and attendance at the symposium will be free for those who volunteer.

It is anticipated that these volunteers will come from non-local club members, as this will negate the need for them to have a hotel room.

- Wood contributions are requested for the above open forum demos. I am the symposium person coordinating collection of wood and will be collecting prior to the event.
- The event will be held at Expo land in Fishersville on November 1st and 2nd, with set-up on October 31st.
- Expoland does not allow outside food catering. They will have food available. Water, soft drinks, and coffee will be provided, with a contribution requested. We will probably also have donuts with the same donation system to cover the cost.
- Admission fees will be \$35 for one day, \$50 for two days attendance.





Take Exit 96 (Lyndhurst Exit) and go north on Delphine Street. After a mile of so you will cross 250E at the Hess Station and join 340 north


Alternatively you can take Exit 99 at the top of Afton Mountain and get onto 250 West .
