The following announcements were made:

- 1. Fred has put 3 copies of Bert Smith's demo on Lidded Boxes in the library.
- 2. The Woodturners of the Virginias have arranged for a demonstration of a treadle woodturning lathe at the Museum of American Frontier Culture in Staunton on the first Saturday in August. Members of the our club can get in free for the demonstration.


1. Dennis Hippen showed a red oak box, a white birch square top bowl, a red plum bowl, a bowl from a 3 week old piece of

holly, a pear bowl, an apple bowl, a maple bowl, an ornamental cherry bowl, a




- 3. Rolf Gebel showed 4 walnut lidded boxes.


