
I spoke of comfort zones in a previous PC, and to me, Safety is doing those things that will take more time, or cost more money than we think we need.





Demonstration: Turning a Platter by Jay Lindhjem

Jay Lindhjem took a class at Woodcraft in Richmond on making platter using wood scraps (leftover wood) from other projects. He uses a 3.5 inch faceplate with turning tape to attach the blank. Turning tape is thicker than carpet tape and much more adhesive. Jay used a golf ball on his live center to prevent indentation. The bottom of the platter faces the tailstock. He made a flat recess for the chuck on the bottom

of the platter approximately 1/16 inch deep to accept the tape and
