ing will be Tuesday January 18, 2011 from 7:00 pm to 9:00 pm. Wood preparation will be the demonstration.


The next club meet—club store. In case you didn't know, Starke took on the store, and financed the entire thing.



Ray Kidd presented a large platter he had made by mounting on a faceplate with double stick tape. Amazing what double stick will hold if applied properly. He also had a couple of attractive cigar pens he had made for gifts and a nice lidded maple bowl he had turned a second time to correct the fit after the wood cured and warped.






Dennis Hippen had a pair of Monticello Poplar bowls and a black birch and spaulted white birch "cookies" per suggestions by Don Voas. He also showed a very nicely figured persimmon "barkin Bowl" with natural edges.
















Tom Evans had a white birch, natural edge bowl with three feet, his "Praying Woman" bowl with a unique bark inclusion that was very difficult to keep together because of the punky wood in the crotch that had to be reinforced with CA and epoxy filled with wood dust. He then showed a commercial plate stand he had been able to reverse to make a wall hanger to support the bowl for display.





Hal Green showed a fancy bowl he had made using a texturing tool bought at the symposium.





Fred Williamson showed a bowl where he had encountered a nail but by carefully working around it had kept the beautiful bowl intact. Hal presented him a certificate recognizing the painless extraction.







Nate Hawkes brought several large bowls made from storm damaged trees from the Charlottesville tornado. A pair were walnut. A hickory natural edged bowl that was difficult to turn but it is a wood that does not bruise and made a beautiful bowl



Don Voas talked about a set of Sorby tools that a friend of his was forced to sell because he can no longer turn.




Gift certificate winners for show and tell were: Richard Landreth Tom Evans Nate Hawkes Gary Dale
