
President's Corner

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Show and Tell:



Gary Dale -Showed his latest bowl and demonstrated how quickly a new turner can produce outstanding work.

Hilel Solomon Showed three bowls. The first a natural edge bowl that was nicely finished. The second was made of a dark wood called Katalox and the third was made from spaulted Maple he obtained from a silent auction.



Charley Conners – Showed a walnut bowl and two cherry wine stoppers on a stainless steel base and 2 nice pens made from Walnut burl. CV

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Phil Evans - Presented a large Maple bowl with a nice raised edge that was finished with a linseed oil based finish. His Apple natural edge bowl with the bark on was stabilized with CA glue and his two figured Walnut bowls were stabilized with 3 felt pads on the bottom to keep them from rocking.



Denny Martin brought two large bowls of spaulted Maple, one of which rested on a walnut stand, that were a real experiment in finishes. He started with lacquer sealer and salad bowl finish but could not get a smooth finish. After seeing the Charles Neil demo at WOV he tried several coats of Enduro-Var. a water-based finish and finally achieved a very smooth gloss




finish. He also showed a metal top his grandson made with an ebony laminated handle - the record spin so far is 4 minutes 11 seconds!



Kevin Johnson – Showed a unique laminated bowl constructed of plywood. The alternating layers made the bowl very attractive. He had also made a pen from Monticello Sugar Maple.

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Dennis Hippen – Had four nested bowls with natural edge that had been cored (with the help of Kirk McCauley) and then remounted and finished individually

making a nice set. His next bowl was made from Zelkova, a type elm that is Dutch Elm disease resistant that is a rapid growth tree which certainly showed in the large growth rings. It was well polished but at this point had no finish.



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Jim Oates - Showed two bowls from neighborhood trees damaged by the Churchville tornado. The first was from a maple crotch and was finished with lacquer. The second was Cherry and was finished with Enduro-Var over a shellac sealer. The two finishes are comparable in looks but the catalyzed water-based finish is more stable. Neither is food-safe but VOC's are

> greatly reduced in the Enduro-Var finish.

Roger Chandler - showed a nicely proportioned Chalice made from

spaulted Maple with a Walnut lid and a maple finial. He also had another maple bowl made from a neighbor's tree that had split in a storm.






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Oak bowls with a variety of colors in the wood that were finished with Behlens Salad Bowl finish. His "cookie sliced" bowl was made from a radial slice of Pin Oak and showed the grain from the center of the tree to the outside. The barely noticeable cracks were filled with CA.





Melton Estes - brought in the finished pieces made on a club loaner lathe for the Boy Scouts awards program. The acorns were made from Maple and the burr was stained with





walnut to make them look very realistic.



Demonstrations: Two demonstrations were presented: Carving by Jim Oates & Chain Saw Maintenance by Nate Hawkes.

The first was by Jim Oates on carving turned pieces. Jim reviewed tools, sharpening, wood selection and showed how basic chip carving techniques are used in all types of carving with small additional cuts. He showed pieces of each type and passed out a handout. Jim brought several of his superbly carved pieces for display.









Nate Hawkes presented a very helpful demo on chain saw maintenance and safety that continued a theme started in the June Newsletter with his demonstration on chain saw safety. His sharpening and maintenance tips will surely improve everyone's saw life and the speed of cuts.







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Height difference - 0.025" - 0.030"

He emphasized the impact of cleaning and lubrication of the bar and chain as well as the proper procedure for sharpening and reducing the depth breaker to approximately 0.030 less then the height of the cutting tooth. We will all check our chain sprockets for wear now that we know the damage that can cause to the chain. Leveling the bar to minimize chain wear was also a major point in the maintenance process that is frequently overlooked.



Shop of the Month:



Organized or chaotic, our shops can symbolize work habits, interests, skills, tidiness (or the lack thereof) and an effort to be creative and make things with our hands, tools and machines. In other words, our shops seem to take on the personality of the wood worker. Our shops may be comprised of a bench-top lathe and hand tools or a full shop of industrial grade machines we all dream about. Impressive results can be realized in both work environments. Whether a weekend woodworker, a retired hobbyist or a professional wood turner, all derive satisfaction from discovering the secrets and beauty in a chunk of wood. Beginner or accomplished, the wood turner strives to improve techniques, become more efficient, and learn from mistakes and from peers, videos or instruction. Shop of the Month - Dennis Hippen

Dennis Hippen has a beautiful shop; the envy of practically any wood turner. Only about 400 sq. ft., his shop is behind he and his wife, Joan's, Waynesboro home. The advantage of course is the unlikely deposit of shavings and dust in the house, a problem with those of us that have our shop in the basement. The down side, however (defending my personal shop), is that during nasty weather we basement-shop-folks don't need to put on a coat or take an umbrella when we want to make shavings. There are no prefect shops or spouse or piece of wood or turned bowl, although we strive for perfection.





Like me, I bet you are wondering how long it took Dennis to get this shop this clean.

The shop is a model of organization and attention to detail... obviously the product of a troubled mind.
