



Central Virginia Woodturners, Planning Meeting Minutes, January 10, 2018

President Bob Welch called the meeting to order at 9:00 AM.

The first agenda item was the review and discussion of the 2018 program led by Mike Sorge. The schedule Mike proposed was endorsed by the Board and is on page 9

Discussion of the schedule and meeting format included several items:

Cost of the April demo is \$500. CVW will charge \$15 for attendance, to include lunch, for the Saturday demo. Cost for the Sunday hands-on class is \$600 for 8 students. We will charge \$100 to attend. The format for Saturday is tentatively, brief business meeting, show & tell, demo, lunch, demo.

The format of show & tell was discussed at length. The consensus is to keep doing what we're doing.

We will not have our regular November meeting in addition to the Symposium.

It was agreed that out of club demonstrators will be paid \$150 plus \$0.35 / mile. Club members will not be paid for demonstrations.

Changing the start time of meetings to 6:30 or 6:45 was discussed. The group agreed that extra time would be beneficial to avoid putting a shortened time constraint on the demonstrator. This will be put to a member vote at the January meeting.

In closing this topic, Mike suggested: a "raffle" for member donated items at the Christmas party and a monthly presidents challenge. The group agreed to a quarterly presidents challenge to be the middle month of the quarter i.e., Feb, May, Aug, Nov.

The next agenda item was membership by Don Voas.

At year end CVW had 102 members, approximately 35 of whom are AAW members. It was noted that a club must have 50 AAW members to qualify for an Arrowmont scholarship.

CVW will no longer offer the \$5 dues discount to AAW members.

Jim Oates noted that the "bios" on the web site need updating. Don will ask Phil Evans to contact Tim Quillen for information on how to do this.

Cheese shop - 2017 income was \$376. A member is needed to take on this job. This will be on the January meeting agenda. If there is no volunteer, the Board will decide whether or not to continue this endeavor. Don will ask Phil Evans to put together a newsletter item regarding name tags.

Brochure and cards update needed. Barbara Dill is doing in return for membership in CVW (great deal for us!) Note that if meeting times changed, all literature needs to be changed also.

Bob Welch will update Harrisonburg Fair and Spitzer Gallery status in the next few months.



Central Virginia Woodturners, Planning Meeting Minutes, January 10, 2018, continued

The next agenda item was the skills center by Jim Oates.

Jim is looking into systems to provide additional ventilation.

Regarding tools, additional gouges are needed. Estimated cost is \$300.

Interest has been expressed in a coring system for the skills center. Issues of practicality and safety will be discussed with experienced members.

Jim will be working to expand the list of approved mentors.

Community Center and Ruritan: Dan Stogdale will coordinate our schedule with Theresa.

Web site: The list of mentors needs updating

Judy Stock discussed the library function.

Judy is working on a more defined check out/in process the she will outline at the January meeting. She also noted that the library contents list should be updated on the web site.

The next agenda was A/V by John O'Neil.

John sees no upcoming budget needs other than routine consumables such as batteries and discs.

John reiterated the need for someone to take on this position as he has done it for 12 years. Further, he has no backup in the event he is able to attend a meeting. For example, snow will prevent John from attending meetings.

The consensus of the group is this should be a group of several members rather than one person handling all of the A/V needs. At least, 2 people are needed during the meetings.

Mike Sorge suggested live Video Demos and will check and get details on how this is done, cost, etc. and submit to us

Kirk McCauley said we need a sign about what is available in store and wood store with how to pay. Some members come to Kirk to pay for wood. Jerry Jorgensen will draft this.

Buck Culver's review of food czar needs focused primarily on the Christmas party. He noted that the party was not well attended and is looking for ideas for a format that will encourage greater participation.

As secretary, Jay Lindhjem will put all meeting minutes on a disc at year end to be kept in the library.

Jerry Jorgensen reviewed the proposed budget that had been sent to all attendees. That budget was approved by the board and will be presented to the membership at the January meeting.

The planning meeting was adjourned at noon.



3 Tricks to make glue work for you

1. Keeping glue in its place with this tidy tray

Minimize the mess – and frustration – when applying glue to pen tubes by using this super-simple glue tray. To make one, cut a $\frac{3}{4}$ "-thick, 2"-wide, 4"-long piece of scrap wood. Then, drill a $\frac{3}{8}$ " hole lengthwise down the center of it. Next, use your bandsaw to cut the piece in half, cutting through the center of the hole. Voila! You have two trays with a "trough" for the glue. When you are ready to glue your pens, fill the trough with glue and then roll the tubes in it.



2. Fix defects with sawdust

Don't let voids, cracks, and small tear outs ruin your blank. When you encounter these defects, keep turning the blank until it is just a little larger than the finished diameter. Then, remove the tool rest and sand the blank from the underside, making sure to catch the sanding dust with the sandpaper. Put some thin-viscosity cyanoacrylate (CA) glue in the void, and then pack it with the sanding dust you collected, wearing gloves to protect your fingers. (For larger defects, consider using small turning shavings.) Apply a coat of CA glue on top of the packed area and add more sanding dust if necessary. After the glue cures turn your blank down to the finished size.



3. Use a potato to keep glue in its place

Glue has a tendency to get on the inside of brass tubes when gluing them in blanks. That excess glue takes time to remove. And if not removed, the glue will create problems at assembly time. To get ahead of the game, seal tube ends with potato plugs. Just cut a ¼" slice of raw potato and press each end of your tube into it. The plugs will come out when trimming the blanks with a barrel trimmer. If using cyanoacrylate (instant) glue, wipe down the outside of the tube before gluing as the potato's moisture will speed the curing time.

Wood Woman: A Retrospective of Multi-Axis Wood Turning by Barbara Dill



February 9 – March 30, 2018

Barbara Dill is a force. It's unusual enough for a woman in a traditionally male-dominated field to create art using slabs of wood as the medium, and Barbara came to it after a successful and colorful career in psychiatric nursing that took her to Europe and East Africa. She studied wood turning with Michael Hosaluk, Ray Key and David Ellsworth before bucking the restraints of symmetry by solving the mathematical mystery that perplexed wood turners until she did so: how to turn wood on a lathe asymmetrically, and most importantly, in a way that could be replicated *consistently*.

Wood Woman will feature a variety of large and small works that exemplify Barbara's equation in a variety of woods, such as Holly and Red Cedar. Her art includes sculptures and functional pieces. The exhibit will also provide a glimpse into the artist's studio, including one of her lathes and other working materials, and a process timeline created by curator Lora Beldon. There will be a brief artist's talk at 8 PM during the opening reception. Barbara will additionally conduct a demonstration on Saturday, Feb. 17, 11 - Noon in the gallery.
