



February 20, 2018 Meeting Minutes Crimora Community Center Central Virginia Woodturners Club

The February meeting, attended by 57, was called to order at 7 PM by Vice President Mike Sorge. He was filling in for President Bob Welch who was unable to attend. He thanked all of the volunteers who serve as officers and help to set up and take down equipment for our meetings.

Chris Culotta has taken over our audio-visual operation. He needs some volunteers to assist him. Many thanks go to John O'Neil for his many years of service to the club. A large round of applause was given John.

It was suggested at the recent officer's planning meeting that an earlier start time for our monthly meeting be considered. After some discussion a vote was taken and the membership voted to start at 6:30 PM.

AAW Woodturning Tip





Golf Ball Depth Stop

Many woodturners begin hollowing a bowl by drilling a depth hole. However, this method requires that the drill bit to be marked in some manner to indicate the depth to drill. Marks can be added to drill bits with pen, pencil, chalk, or pieces of tape, none of which are easy to use with any degree of precision.

Because I have used drilled golf balls for tailstock support and numerous other applications, I wondered if a golf ball could serve as an adjustable sleeve to mark the depth point on a drill bit. Most of my bowls are drilled with a $\frac{3}{4}$ " (19 mm) Morse taper bit, so I used the same bit to drill a $\frac{3}{4}$ " (19 mm) hole through a golf ball. I can adjust the position of the ball on the drill bit to indicate the desired depth.

This system worked even better than I expected. The thick tough rubber on the golf ball keeps a snug fit. The position of the ball can be easily adjusted, yet it does not move as the depth hole is drilled. I have also used this system with a 3/8" (10 mm) tapered drill bit.

Clothespins epoxied to a board work great for holding strips of sandpaper. Write the grit number on each clothespin to keep the different grits separated and within easy reach.

To expand on the tip for holding sandpaper (above), one could cut the base board to fit the space between the body of the lathe. That holds the holder in place and keeps it where you want it. It would also free up both hands so one hand could open the clothespin and the other could retrieve the sandpaper.

I wanted to share this educational moment with the club. I always engage the protective shield associated with my Powermatic, but I sometimes work with wood contains checks (in this case Mesquite) because of the beauty of the wood. I will be much more careful in the future after having this chunk bounce off my shield.

- Do not use a dead center on the tailstock. A dead center, which does not turn, creates friction and may burn the work, damaging the product and creating potential hazards.
- Provide plenty of lighting for your work. Poor lighting and shadows can increase fatigue.
- Never leave the lathe running unattended. Keep the lathe unplugged when not in use and before making adjustments.
- Clean up wood shavings and sawdust often. Sawdust can create a fire hazard and an explosive atmosphere.
- Store a standard, well equipped first-aid kit in the shop where it is easily accessible.
- Never wear loose clothing or jewelry.
- Keep long sleeves rolled up and long hair tied back.
- Wear a dust mask when performing sanding operations.
- Always wear safety goggles or a face shield.
- Wear sturdy shoes or boots with non-slip soles.
- Wear ear plugs or ear muffs for hearing protection.
