Don opened giving a brief bio of himself and his woodturning activity. He described a wide variety of sanding accessories and vacuum chuck holders he has developed and makes for use in his shop. Many of his tools are shop made, including a favorite from a planer blade.

During his demonstration, Don turned:

A ball, jam chucked and turned 90 degrees through 3 axes A pendant, utilizing a jig that permitted off-center work for the center hole A 3" diameter mirror frame A lamp pull

During a short break in the demonstration, Don answered many questions regarding the setup and jig he uses to make the slender goblets he described during show and tell. Don has since sent photos and a description of the process that Mike Sorge has forwarded to the membership.

Don's finish of choice is EEE Ultra Shine and Shellawax...both made in Australia by U Beaut Polishes.

June 19, 2018, Meeting Minutes Crimora Community Center Central Virginia Woodturners Club

The June meeting, attended by 46, was called to order at 6:30 PM by president Bob Welch. He thanked all who help with set up and clean up at the meeting.

Bob noted that librarian Judy Stock has been taken seriously ill and will not be able to continue that position. He asked for a volunteer to fill the position. Bob also reminded the group to check at home for several items that are still missing from the library. He also suggested a challenge for members to turn knitting needles (Judy's specialty) for the next meeting.

Bob then thanked the group, headed by Tom Evans, that constructed the framing for the two new 1.5 ton air conditioners installed in the meeting room.

Tom Evans thanked the Ruritans for their support with the electrical wiring needed for the AC units. Tom also commented on the Ruritans continued support over the years on many improvements to the Crimora facility. He noted that their next dinner / theater fund raiser will be August 26 & 27. Following a short break, Mike Sorge introduced guest demonstrator Charlie Wortman.

Charlie discussed and demonstrated sphere and egg turnings. He doesn't use jigs, turning the items free hand.

He uses a safety drive center that helps to alleviate severe catches.

Charlie discussed skew chisel grinds and the various cuts made with a skew; planing, peeling and facing.

Turning the egg, he used a $1/2^{"}$ spindle gouge, a fluted parting tool and a "butter knife" parting tool.

While turning a sphere, Charlie uses a caliper for measurement. He showed several cup centers used for sphere turning. The spindle gouge is used for the 1st orientation, and a pull cut with a bowl gouge for succeeding orientations.



Charlie discussed turning a whistle, noting that detailed instructions are on line.

The demonstration was concluded with a demonstration of texturing copper tubing and a review of several dyes and coloring techniques for eggs and spheres.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:15.



Work Hardening Copper Wire By Charlie Wortman



To make a wire support for an ornament or hanging item, I like to use copper electrical wire. In it's existing state, the wire is soft and would bend under the weight of some ornaments. I harden or stiffen the wire by hammering, also known as work hardening or cold working. This changes the structure of the copper wire causing the wire to become more rigid. Other methods of hardening include twisting or drawing.

Using the face of the hammer, strike the copper wire while rotating and moving along in short stretches till the entire length is hammered/ textured. Next, use a dead blow hammer to straighten the copper wire on a large flat wooden block. Bend a hook on one end with round nose pliers, clamp this end to a work surface and form the curve to suit the project. Steel wool the copper and you are done.


The copper will oxidize naturally as does a penny or copper roof. The use of paints, oxidizing paints, patina mixtures, etcetera, can create a desired finish to the texture. Applying a wax such as Renaissance Wax or a clear spray coating will help maintain the brilliance of the freshly worked copper.

I use a 10" section of railroad rail as an anvil. The rail has some surface rust but is not too deep so I have kept the pitted surface as it adds texture to the hammered copper work piece. The hammer I use is a 2-pound ball pein hammer, which I've used since the '70s. The face of the hammer has become dinged with use, which adds texture from the hammer blows as well. The copper being the softer metal conforms nicely to these surfaces.
