Fred, Alex, and Kirk are on the tour in November. Please get out and support your friends and brothers and sisters in the craft.





#### **Turners' Corner - New Feature**

I quote Dennis below:

In the beginning, this very large maple burl challenge was from a family that delivered it to my shop for bowls/other. This was about the 3rd largest burl I have turned out of 5-6 large burls over the years. This burl I rolled out of their SUV and almost busted the concrete in the driveway. I had to round up a young neighbor to help me place on a 2 wheel cart and muscle back to my woodpile. This burl was about 22" W X 23" L that had grown on a 6" limb and very solid.

Photos depict the burl cut into chunks for bowls. The largest bowl was cored (see photo) and a photo of the outside of the largest bowl in process. Photos of inside and outside of the largest bowl + 6 smaller bowls - most have bark on.

Burls are a fun challenge from start to finish. The burl owners will keep some of the bowls/cheese board and will gift others to 5 grandkids for Xmas. The total yield from this maple burl was 9 finished bowls + 1 finished cheese board + 6 more various size cheese/bar boards + 2 dozen pen blanks + 12 handle size blanks still drying.

I had the owners of the burl stop by and choose the colors they wanted voids filled with. One bowl has turquoise pigment and the other has Caribbean Ocean pigment. Five of the nine bowls had voids filled.





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
