

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Turners' Corner

Mike Sorge - Clear coating VerDay patina metal finishes to seal and protect:

What type of clear coat protective finish can be applied that will not discolor the four VerDay metal (brass, bronze, copper & iron) patina colorations?

I turned 4 round maple cylinders and painted the complete surface of one with brass, one with bronze, one with copper and one with iron. Once dried, I sponge painted a stripe of each of the 4 metals on the surface of each cylinder and sprayed with the activating agent to "patina color" the 4 metals on each cylinder. This demonstrated/revealed the patina color that resulted from each of the 4 metal paints on each of the 4 metal undercoats.

Finally, to test the two types of clear coat protective finishes, lacquer vs polycrylic, I sprayed the left side of each cylinder with lacquer and the right side with polycrylic. The left lacquer side changed and muddled the patina metal colors badly, but the right polycrylic side gave a protective clear coat without changing the patina metal colors!



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Dennis Hippen - Tips for colder weather and unheated shops- finishes

Many of us do not heat our shops 24/7 and that can cause many problems when trying to apply finishes. I am sure there are other suggestions and please share.

The tip(s) are to make sure you follow directions as to the best temperature of the finish and also the wood items to have finish applied. Most products fall into the 65-70 degree range per instructions. Humidity is another issue, but good luck controlling that. You chemists can tell us if cold shops extend the finish cure time. I have a guess but chemists are always right!!!!

I use an old hair dryer to heat my quart cans of finish before use. Same goes for wood bowls in the process.

In addition, if you are doing the epoxy castings, read the label as notes the similar warm temps for best results. I am still on a steep learning curve on this topic. You can also place containers in pots of hot water, but do not take your spouse's best pots in the house!




