Safety Minute - A Sobering Close Call

Several years ago a friend who'd worked in an emergency room insisted that I buy a set of chainsaw chaps. I told him that I'd been using a chainsaw for decades and cut many large and small trees without a problem. I'd never heard of chainsaw chaps. Then he described what chainsaw injuries look like and how much muscle they take.

I bought a pair of chainsaw chaps and several weeks later as I was taking them off at the end of a day of cutting trees on a slope I noticed a cut in my chaps where they covered my right knee cap. I called my friend and sincerely thanked him for keeping me safe.

Today another friend and I dropped three big ash trees, which I've been cutting up since he left. I had switched to my Stihl 440 to go through the larger stuff and as I was pulling the bar out of the log after taking my finger off the trigger I felt the saw tug a bit. I looked down and saw the cut in my newer chaps (photo) where the coasting chain apparently caught just as it passed under the sprocket guard. I'll patch them with tape and be thankful I'm not going to the emergency room.

As you know the added benefit of chaps is that they take a whole lot of the dirt and oil, keeping laundry and marital relations a lot better.



Gel Pens for Marking Wood

One can use a white gel marker from Michaels on your dark wood markings. Marker is a Gelly Roll 10. Write slowly when using. Also, this Rosewood is very naturally oily. Use your favorite sanding sealer liberally and wipe excess off and let dry/sand with 600 before applying any finish. I learned the hard way. – Dennis Hippen



Florida Palm brought back from Florida in February. A 9" diameter log of a palm tree cut wet from my daughter/son-in-laws home. This wood was very heavy/dense, and one had to clear the chainsaw at least twice for each cut as wet dust acted like a gluey mess. I had never turned palm and an interesting experience. One needs to sharpen tools more frequently as suspected sand in the wood dulls tools quickly like the Indian Rosewood from the same property. Bowl is very heavy and has 5 coats of sealer/finish. Will be residing in Florida soon.


Spalted Hackberry bowls with natural fungus growths in the wood. Fungus colors are a nice bonus and I used thin super glue to keep the colors from fading (I hope). Bowls are about 10" diameters. I have 2 more half logs to turn too.

Log of Willow Oak has nice spalting/bugs homes, but was very close to firewood and lost the top end on one bowl as too soft. These are about 7" diameter bowls.

Black Oak vase, trunk wood at the base of a 4' diameter rotten tree. The wood is surprisingly (to me) dense and heavy and I had to do a lot of frequent sharpening to hollow it out. 14" tall.
