Hands On Class - Production Bowls Process

CVW is hosting Peter Welch on October 29^{th...} Peter will demonstrate his Production Bowl process and teach it to you! If you are looking for tips and tricks to speed up your bowl turning process this is great learning opportunity.

Date: October 29, 2022Time: 9:30 a.m. start

• Subject: Production Bowl Turning

- **Skill Level:** Advanced beginner/intermediate and above. This is <u>not</u> a session on how to turn a bowl or how to use a gouge, but rather a hands-on event to demonstrate and learn how to speed up the process without sacrificing quality. <u>The student must be comfortable and confident in their use of a bowl gouge and other tools.</u>
- **Tools:** Students will bring their own tools. The club has two (2) sharpening systems so you will be able to sharpen your gouges as needed.
- Wood: Students will be responsible for bringing their own wood. The wood can be either wet or kiln dried. The blank should be at least 3" thick and 10 to 12 inches in diameter. If you bring a non-round section of wood, the club has a band saw available to knock the corners off and make it round. If you prep your wood in advance and it is green/wet, make sure you seal it with something like anchor-seal or wrap it in plastic wrap so it will not split or crack. Placing it in a dark plastic trash bag works well too. I would recommend that you bring 2 blanks with you "just in case".
- **Lunch:** Liz Browne will be in attendance and will make a run up to the corner store for sandwiches. *The cost of lunch is not included in the fee.* Of course, you can bring your own lunch if you wish. Please bring cash with you if you intend to order a sandwich.
- Fee: \$15.00 per student to cover equipment and material expenses.
- Class Availability: Six (6)

Turners' Corner

You are invited to write something to share with fellow woodturners, be it amusing, informative, instructive, or scary. It can be personal, anonymous, or professional.

Photos are of the same 5 gouges with different angle shots for better visibility. Bowl gouges left to right have 3 that are modified(stem 1,3,5) have been ground down flat toward the handle so one can use your oneway wolverine sharpening system vari-jig.

I clamp the handle in a vise and ensure the flute is straight up and then grind with a 4 1/2" grinder to flatten.

Be aware of nearby wood chips as may be more action then wanted. The 1/2" and 5/8" Thompson tools have seen much use and the 2 shorter ones are evidence of me trying to learn to sharpen with much trial and error with white diamond wheels. The Thompson tools are made to use all the way of length of tool. Some gouges are not.

Fred Williamson is a free hand sharpener expert and has a different method to extend life of his gouges. Dennis
