My Wood Turning Journey with Mike Sorge

I recently had the great pleasure of visiting Mike Sorge for a tour of his work shop and a learning/turning session. Mike and Cindy are gracious hosts, and Mike was not only generous with his time, but also with his knowledge.

I came away with insights beyond what I expected:

*For every "problem" you have, there is a product you can buy. There are a multitude of tools marketed to wood turners to address particular situations. But you can keep it simple, develop your skills working with basic gouges/chucks and achieve success without all the extras. The simplicity of Mike's approach, proven by the elegance of his work, has changed my perception of where best to invest my money as a new turner.

*Duplicate tools are not redundant. 3 or 4 sharp gouges, ground to the same shape and angle, means you can keep cutting without having to stop to sharpen mid-bowl. Duplicates may seem like a luxury, but very helpful for production turning. I'd rather reach for the next sharp gouge than stop to sharpen. Plus, when it's time to sharpen, tackle them all at once. Very efficient.

*Selecting gouges. Steel quality matters of course. But the lifespan of gouges also depends on the length of the flute. A terrific (and expensive) gouge with a short flute length will grind down and need to be replaced sooner than one with a longer flute.

*Lathe speed. Sometimes slower is scarier than fast. Especially when turning air. As a beginner, this is something I've had to wrap my head around. Faster speed reveals the shape more clearly, and using fine cuts, reduces the potential for catches.

*Light matters. I have one light and a window I rely on. But Mike's light set-up changed my attitude about buying "expensive" light fixtures. You can't fix what you can't see. The more you see, the better your results.

I could say much more about my visit with Mike. Shop layout. Dust collection. Compressed air. Organization. Efficiency. A bonus session on coring. And of course, technique. But my main take away is the knowledge that wood turners are generous, supportive, and good people.



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


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

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
