Mentor's Corner


Dennis continues to hold pen-making mentorship sessions in his shop.

Beads of Courage

Please bring your Beads of Courage contributions and put into the box in the back of the back room. Below are two vessels from Kirk McCauley and I neglected to capture image of the vessels Alan Driver brought in as well as contributions from others. Please note the Guidelines below, especially the interior dimensions.

Dimensions:

- Interior for turned boxes: 6" diameter (5" min.), 5" height (4" min.)
- Interior for flatwork boxes: 4"x6"x4"

Base and lids:

• Box bases should be wide enough so the box is stable and does not tip over easily. Lids for Beads of Courage boxes should be easy for small or ill children to remove or lift. Any finials should be easy for a small child to grasp and not too elaborate, so they don't break.

Show-and-Tell


