I think we all had a lot of fun. Under three tents in the store's parking lot, we turned spin tops, bottle stoppers, and bottle opener handles on Scott's lathe and two Jet mini lathes from the Skills Center. The items made and a variety of previously turned bowls, platters, and other pieces were displayed on tables and a shelf unit, as shown in the photos taken by Dennis Hippen.

Dewey Hensley, the store manager, and Debbie Howe, who oversees the store's large Stihl chainsaw department, were great collaborators in helping us put on this event. Show-and-Tell



Wood came from a mangled limb that was about 17" diameter. Cedar is aromatic and I had to open the windows in my shop because it was almost too strong. There are still 2 huge cedars on the property that are bleeding sap and not looking green. These will be felled and made into natural edge slabs. Bowl is 14 1/2" W X 4" H. Dennis

A recent storm downed an old black locust tree across the entrance to our development. Driving by, I noticed it's ornate grain patterns. Its owner was having difficulty getting help clearing it. He said it was because no one wanted its acrid smelling wood. He told me I was welcome to cut all I want if I take what I cut. The more I turned it, the darker the grain appeared. Despite it being freshly cut, black locust wood challenged me to keep my gouges sharp. Sanding softened its appearance. Seems ironic that it's possible to make attractive Potpourri Scent Diffusers using wood from a smelly old locust tree.... Once turned, sanded to 400g and polished, the tight grain patterns in black locust could easily be mistaken for sculpted marble!
