Shop Tips

There are many methods that turners have used to add stability/weight to their larger lathes. The CVW Skills lathes have several different methods that work. The Jet 16" VS 2HP lathe in the photos came from a turners shop purchase in Greenville, SC. now in my son's shop in Cashiers,NC mountain house.

First we removed the wheels from the lathe and placed levelers on the feet. A \$30 scissor jack from Harbor freight powered by a drill was a must.

We used the lower/wider bracket with 2" (1.5") thick boards and width was 16", cut to length. (one could make this bottom section wider in the back for more pails of sand.) For a bigger lathe like the powermatic 3520b, I would opt for wider bottom and more pails of sand.

We made a 2 section shelf of plywood (2 sections so we could install to max length) with a underside scab board to make level. The pails do not have lids which gave us a lower shelf for tools along with the VERY easy to brush off the chips. Again, if make for a powermatic make shelf wider to. 4 pails of sand+1 bag of dry play sand gave us about 500 #s of weight.

FYI. For weight on my powermatic I used real sandbags and covered with a small tarp. Downside is the bags get nicked and no more sand/mess to. Please use/improve as you want. Dennis
