Turners' Corner

The photos are of a Maple Limb Heal Over wood chunk. This presented a new challenge in figuring out how to turn a piece with a big hole in the middle. The wood was 7" H X 9" W at the start and heavy/dense too. Good news it was still pretty green as I left in the outdoor woodpile. I had no idea what I would run into while turning much less a shape in mind when I started.

Photos show the height and width with the hole on the middle and then my jerry-rigged method for mounting on the lathe.

Photos show the heal over mounted and initial turning + a photo of all bark removed and a large tenon in place. At this point I could turn up the speed and able to get a much smoother surface. See the photo where it is in the chuck and ready to turn the rim and inside.

The 2024 Virginia Woodturners Symposium is on November 2-3 at the EXPO center in Fishersville. https://virginiawoodturners.com. Central Virginia Woodturners is again the local host due to our proximity to the EXPO.

CVW is responsible for equipping and staffing one of the seven demonstration areas (PODS). Other Virginia clubs will be responsible for the other demonstration areas. We will be providing a Powermatic lathe, a mini-Jet for the information area, overhead and floor cameras, lighting

We need many volunteers to help us move equipment (lathes, sharpening stand, signage, easels, cameras, electrical equipment, lights, etc.) from the Skill Center to the Symposium and set it up starting at 9AM - 3 PM-ish Friday November 1. We will also need help dismantling and moving equipment back to the Skill Center after the last demonstration at 3 PM on Sunday. Please let us know if you can assist or just show up!

Videographers Volunteers Needed for Virginia Symposium

- Norm Reid will provide names to Registration Team, which will issue complimentary entrance badges.

Videographer Responsibilities

- Participate in pre-symposium orientation for videographers at 7:00 Saturday morning sharp.
- Adjust camera and monitor setup in assigned station from 7:30-8:00 Saturday morning.
- Be prepared for demonstrations to begin promptly at 8:30 am.
- Set up the video equipment in the best locations to show the demonstrations.
- Be fully familiar with operation of cameras and mixing/switching equipment.
- Clean up and set up demonstration station before each demonstration.
- Assure that all symposium-provided tools and equipment are present and ready to use.
- Conduct audio and video checks as needed.
- Assure that speakers don't bleed over into surrounding demonstration areas.
- Assure that proper signage is in place before each demonstration.
- During demonstrations, provide good views of the demonstration from each camera.
- Operate each of two cameras for each demonstration (two videographers at each session).
- Keep attention focused on high quality presentation of the demonstrations and don't get
- distracted by watching the demonstration.
- Be diligent for unsafe practices by demonstrators.
- Break down the A/V setup after the symposium and secure VWI and Club equipment.



The whiskey stopper is from an actual bourbon barrel stave with green epoxy. I wet sanded it and you could smell the bourbon! Gretchen came in the shop and wondered why she smelt whiskey!! The bowl is a spalted maple using a box cutting technique (straighter sides). The solid wands are poplar, maple, wormy cherry, & walnut. The two wood wands are maple & bloodwood; walnut & Osage Orange; cherry & blue Spectraply, zebra wood w/ a small green epoxy fill & walnut.




