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#### "Sharing a little about Art Shows" - Mike Sorge

Here in the eastern US, there are many highly rated juried arts and craft shows as in the Smithsonian Craft Show, Winter Park Sidewalk Art Show, Artisphere, Armonk, Tephra ICA Arts Festival, Rittenhouse Square, Bethesda Row, etc... There are also many middle tier and lower tier juried art shows. Over the past dozen years I've exhibited my work at all levels, and as my work elevated, I increased my efforts with more highly rated shows.

Matthew Hatala (GA), John Mascoll (FL), and Nick Barnes (VA) are the three woodturners I see the most at highly rated art shows. There work is exquisite, they win many awards, and they're each upstanding individuals. To my knowledge they're not members of an AAW chapter club, and I haven't seen their work in American Woodturner magazine, but if you haven't seen their work, look them up. Matthew and John do similar work (hollow forms with finials) and occasionally exhibit at the same shows.

There are often woodturners exhibiting at various shows who specialize in wood bowls or spindle turned items such as pens, pepper mills, rolling pins, and utensils like ice cream scoops. Some offer a combination of many woodturned items. And there are some woodturners who specialize exclusively in writing pens; one excellent pen turner exhibited their massive collection of turned pens at this past Smithsonian Craft Show.


Art shows are always adventurous. There are endless fun and wild experiences various artists have told us about, and we've had several of our own. We share our work and experiences, eat, drink and strive to be merry regardless of circumstance including the weather and whether enough of the "right" people attend each show.

Inevitably, while exhibiting at various art shows, several unknown woodturners will visit my art booth and we (Cindy and I) usually enjoy sharing with them - that is if my booth isn't busy with potential customers. There's often one or two annoying woodturners or woodworkers who pop in overly eager to talk about themselves, want to proudly show photos of their work, show little or no concern for why we're there, overstay and need to be kindly ushered out.



There are fewer indoor shows such as The Smithsonian Craft Show, American Craft Made Baltimore, Philadelphia Museum of Art Craft Show, Southern Highlands Craft Guild Craft Fairs, Richmond Craft & Design, but they're less physically demanding since no exhibit tent is necessary, and weather isn't a concern.



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
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
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#### **Show and Tell**


Fred Williamson Rotten sassafras, Osage orange.
